

At AmeriPride, a family-owned business that was founded more than 125 years ago, Lifeworks Associate Brian Kley is just another one of the guys.

As part of a three-person team, Kley loads and unloads truckloads of shipments that travel between locations such as Rochester and Sioux Falls.

"He wants everything done right," said Customer Operations Manager Scott Voss. "He leads the group. We've had a lot of turnover, and he's been through everything. He's doing a great jobs of training the new guys. I'm very impressed with what he does and how he handles himself."

As someone who enjoys manual labor and a job well-done, Kley has thrived as an AmeriPride employee for the past nine months, often looking to pick up extra hours and sometimes working 50 hours per work.

"He fits in very well with the guys," said Customer Administration Manager Scott Wetzel. "It took a while, but the route men have warmed up to him, and tease him - in a positive way - and Brian dishes it back."

PROGRAM FOR JOB SEEKERS REVOLUTIONIZING HOW PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES FIND WORK



For many people, searching for a job is a daunting task. Finding the perfect combination of skills, interests, and wages isn't easy for anyone, but it often presents additional challenges for people with disabilities.

Lifeworks aims to bridge that gap. Through an employment program with smaller group sizes and more one-on-one support, we're helping job seekers find a career more quickly. While searching for a job, participants learn about career possibilities, identify employment themes, and create personal employment plans. But the secondary skills they learn along the way are often just as valuable. For Adam, he learned about the importance of navigation skills on his first day in the program.

"I actually had to laugh," he said. "The day I was doing my first class here I got lost because I was kind of in a rush to get home."

For other participants like Julia, learning to voice their opinion has allowed them to increase their independence. Everyone involved is growing as they make an informed choice about competitive, integrated employment.

"We're not applying for jobs just to get by," said small group facilitator Amy Herz. "We want something that you actually like to do, that you want to do, and you get to pick what that's going to be."

While some job seekers are entirely new to Lifeworks, others have been around for many years. Regardless, everyone has benefited from the opportunity to take charge of their job search, identify career themes, and grow as human beings.

Travis Sprenger is no stranger to hard work. He's worked in the food industry for Old Country Buffet, Buffalo Wild Wings, Hardee's, and Culver's. He's worked in sales, assembly, housekeeping, cleaning, and janitorial. Today, Sprenger is a valued employee at Dollar Tree, where the skills he's honed at his previous jobs have allowed him to excel.



"I kind of do a little bit of everything," Spregner said when asked about his current position. "Open in the morning, fill all the drink coolers, the balloon center, sweep the floors."

And those responsibilities are in addition to stocking shelves and serving as a cashier. Sprenger's versatility is something Dollar Tree desires in all its employees.

"They interact with us really well and give us all the tools we need to succeed," Sprenger said.

Though Sprenger was initially a temporary worker, Dollar Tree promptly hired him. With minimal support from a Lifeworks job coach, he's become an exemplary employee, recently earning the title of "cashier of the week" after helping more than 450 customers. Though Sprenger said he enjoys all aspects of his job, one thing stands out.

"Seeing all the babies and the kids. You could have a horrible day, but all the little kids come in here, they make you smile."

Sprenger celebrated his one-year anniversary with the company in November.
